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ANOTHER LIFE TOUCHED

It was a busy Thursday at the Water of Life clinic. We had just started filling prescriptions for the swarm of people at our pharmacy window when Doc Alexis burst into the pharmacy and began bustling around giving orders Doc-style. "I need some vinegar, sugar, and triple antibiotic," he announced rummaging through the bins and cupboards.

"Umm...I don't think we have any," I replied.

"Oh yes, we always keep some on hand and we need it right away," he replied enthusiastically. "We have a young man with a two-inch hole in his leg all the way to the muscle."

I quickly ran up to the Children's Home and Alicia gladly supplied me with a jar of apple cider vinegar and a container of sugar.

Back in the pharmacy Doc showed me how to mix up a new and improved version of triple antibiotic, especially designed for wounds which have stopped responding to antibiotics. We whipped up a bit of sugar, a splash of vinegar, and a container of triple antibiotic, and headed over to Nurse Mdm. Wilhem's room.

She called the 25-year-old man into her room. He slowly and painfully climbed on the examining table. I couldn't believe my eyes when Mdm. Wilhem lifted the bandage off his wound. Literally a two-inch-wide, two-inch-deep hole into his leg straight to the raw, tender, pink cord of muscle. Yellowish-green pus oozed out the sidewalls of the wound.

As we worked on packing the wound with the



triple antibiotic mixture, we visited with the young man. He told us how he had visited many doctors and clinics, all to no avail. He told us how one day there was a huge bubble on his leg, the next day it burst and a gallon of fluid drained out of it. We finished and wrapped his leg up neatly with gauze and tape. He winced in pain as he descended the table and hobbled to the pharmacy to fill his prescription.

He had an appointment for the next week and he was there. We repeated the treatment. By the next week we saw huge improvement. The last time he came, his leg was nearly healed. He was so happy and kept thanking us and praising the Lord for healing. Nothing like Jesus' touch, a few tablespoons of sugar, a splash of vinegar, and half a cup of triple antibiotic to heal a leg.

MECHANICALLY SPEAKING

When I was asked to serve here at IFM as a mechanic, I came from a fully equipped, North American auto repair shop having been trained as a mechanic with access to the tools for the job. Coming to Haiti to be a mechanic with only the very basic tools needed, or even making the tool you need to get the job done, was an adjustment! Not to say I do not enjoy the challenge of being this kind of mechanic!

As for the challenges that are faced from day to day, suspension and body maintenance on vehicles that run gravel and rock roads all the time, includes ball joint replacement at least once a year on most of the vehicles, spring repairs, shocks, axle mounts, etc. The most difficult part of this is getting replacement parts here in a timely fashion. Purchasing parts in country for our American model vehicles is nearly impossible, and there can be a long delay in sending parts from the states. Poor fuel quality and dirty fuel is something else that we deal with at times. This can mean gasoline engines that will not get you home from the gas station, due to poor fuel quality. These can be the causes of vehicles sitting, for months on end.

Another thing that we are facing is the rising lake taking what little work space we did have. The flat area that I was using to do most of the mechanic work is now part of the lake, or has become a swamp because the lake is pushing springs in that area. This problem is not getting better, as the



lake continues to rise steadily day by day. We are currently working on making a level area behind the shop, and cutting an entrance in the back, to get the longest possible use of the shop.

In closing, I would like to give all my fellow mechanics, and knowledgeable individuals who willingly give of their time, for technical service phone calls, a big thank you for their part in the ministry here. Without this, I would be lacking a very valuable resource, a second opinion!

VULNERABLE HAITI

On January 12, 2010, a huge, sudden disaster hit Haiti killing over 200,000 people. Most of these people lived in the crowded city of Port-au-Prince. Over the past 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ years, Christian missions, NGOs, governments, and non-profits have worked together to help with the disaster. By many indicators Haiti has recovered from the earth-quake. Haiti has the fastest growing economy in the Caribbean for 2 years in a row¹. The International Monetary Fund (IMF) projects Haiti's economy to grow 4.5% in 2012 and 6.5% in 2013².

But a slower, silent disaster is taking place in the mountains of Haiti. Subsistent farmers have been struggling for years to put food on the table for their families.

Crop yields have been dropping due to deforestation, drought, and erosion. When these farmers have crop failures, they do the only thing they know to do to feed their family (even though they stay very hungry). They cut down the few remaining trees to make charcoal to sell.

mountains, taking off roofs, and destroying crops. One farmer had his red beet seedling just ripped out of the ground.

This silent, slow disaster taking place in the mountains of Haiti has a solution. Planting trees will serve as wind breaks to protect crops and homes from the brunt of the hurricane force winds. Planting live terraces will hold the water and soil on the mountain sides where they can produce crops. Increase in crop yields will enable the farmers to protect their trees, so that they do not cut them down to feed their families.

As we know, many organizations have claimed to plant trees, but where are the results? Agriculture devel-

opment can be difficult for big organizations to do effectively, but smaller missions (such as IFM) often see results due to their grassroots level of ministry. There is a wealth of information from agricultural research sources like ECHO³ and others, to equip us. To start, we envision beginning in two different ways. First, we would begin by starting several "for profit"

nurseries in the mountains of Pays Pourri. Subsidizing the trees to make them affordable for the mountain farmers is also an option being considered. The second thing would be to do a test project,

While the northeastern United States was preparing for Superstorm Sandy, Haitian mountain farmers were looking over the damage. Thirty inches of rain fell across the mountains in less than a week. This water rushed down the mountains, taking tons of good topsoil with it. Flooded rivers eroded their banks taking houses with them. In the valleys, the



water flooded through yards and homes, raising the water in the already flooded lakes. Winds ripped across the

planting live terraces. As the neighboring farmers see the results, they will want to duplicate it in their own fields.
